

## CHORÉGRAPHIE D'UN MONDE DISJOINT TUDI DELIGNE

What role does image play when reality seems increasingly swept up in destructive forces? How might chaos be expressed while still offering an escape? These are some of the questions that Tudi Deligne relentlessly explores to create drawings that both mirror the present while projecting towards another dimension of time and space.

Working with charcoal, graphite or pastel, in both colour and black and white, the Franco-Swiss artist brings together various mediums and techniques to unlock new creative possibilities. His sources of inspiration are equally diverse – children's drawings, works by old masters such as Caravaggio and Rubens, cave paintings, comic strips and illustrations. This whirlwind of forms converges into a singular image. In the finished work, these original sources become hard to distinguish, emerging only faintly, if at all. Yet human figures, almost always, stand out, grounding the composition. The reappearance of the figure, even in fleeting or suggestive form, highlights the importance of the human element in Deligne's work, who is also a highly skilled dancer.

In this exhibition, Deligne tests the limits of form, focusing on the point at which abstraction takes over. It is as if the absurdity of the world suddenly overwhelms all established paradigms, archetypes and narratives. His new imagery delivers a rearticulation of this content with a poetic touch. He creates an unfamiliar language, weaving together strange but harmonious connections, resolving dissonances, as though it were the choreography of a disjointed world.


The spontaneous lines that thread through this imagined world reveal that it is, in fact a deliberate construction – a space between reality and fiction, or even a still image that captures the movement of pictorial thought. The notion of time in this creative process follows he same principle: nothing is fixed, with detailed sections coexisting alongside mere outlines. To what extent can intelligibility be conceived, and must we ultimately move beyond it? Deligne's exhibition blends familiar references with entirely new images, even incorporating a dialogue with artificial intelligence. This could be read as a logical extension of his work, as AI mimics and combines languages without understanding them – making it an intriguing counterpart to human cognition. The handling of this infinity of possibilities is then addressed by the artist, whose images reflect the overwhelming amount of information that today's brain must process.

The exhibition thus offers a journey where technical mastery intersects with aesthetic reflection on society. Particularly timely, the exhibition calls upon the imagination to reclaim a threatened freedom of mind.
